In a recent article 'Historians recommend moving Australia Day away from January 26' news.com.au 3 Jan 25, ANU historian Professor Angela Woollacott states that "the debate around January 26 will go on forever and the only way to just clear the deck is to have a new date." CQUniversity historian Dr Benjamin Jones agrees and poses the question "Is there a possible alternative?"

The answer to that in our view is YES.
